

We have a unique story, including how the design of our logo came to be.






Our Vision

Our Approaches to Learning

An inquiry kura:

Guided by an inquiring approach, we follow the process of creating and designing inquiring mindsets to ensure deep, connected, meaningful learning and action.

Strengthening coherent learning pathways:

Our Local Curriculum ensures our learning pathways are authentic and connect to our vision and values as our ākonga move through their learning journey.

Collaboration:

Approaches to teaching and learning are vital here as staff and ākonga grow in their skills to effectively collaborate with each other and their peers.

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L):

Through modelling teaching and celebrating positive behaviours and our kura values, we provide an environment where our diverse community is committed to empowering, connected, lifelong lerarners.

Whānau engagement:

We invite and empower our whānau to be actively engaged in all aspects of learning.

- fostering learning-focused relationships
- building partnerships with parents, whānau, iwi and hapū, and the wider community
- ensuring that everyone in our community feels a sense of ownership of our local curriculum
